## SUMMARY OF FISHERIES STATISTICS OF BRITISH COLUMBIA - 1960

#### Total Value of Fish and Fish Products

The total market value of all fish and liver products in 1960 was reported as 52.3 million dollars, down 45.9 million dollars (or 48%) from the record total reported in 1958, which included the very large Adams River sockeye catch.

#### This value does not include:

- the value of 6,706,000 pounds of halibut caught by B. C. fishermen and landed at United States ports in Washington and Alaska;
- the market value of tuna canned by B. C. companies from frozen tuna imported from Japan and the United States;
- the market value of canned salmon from 1959 frozen stocks (the value of this frozen fish was included in the 1959 report).

The total market value of all the above totalled \$2,991,487.

The decline in total landings and total value of marketings can be attributed to several factors:

- (1) Salmon landings were the lowest since records were first maintained in 1910.

  Runs were lower than the below-average returns anticipated.
- (2) There was only a limited herring fishery between January 1 and November 20 as lower prices for meal and oil forced companies to discontinue herring operations. The herring seine fleet resumed operations in November but unit returns and prices for meal and oil were down from the previous year.
- (3) Landings of halibut by Canadian fishermen increased sharply and reached peak levels but lower prices resulted in only slightly higher values of marketings.

Most other products showed increases, some as a result of increased landings; others because of increased unit prices. Some species, such as grey cod, increased as a result of specialized forms of processing.

#### SALMON

The market value of salmon in 1960 dropped to 36.0 million dollars despite higher unit marketing prices for most salmon products. The value of salmon marketing in 1960 was the lowest since 1949.

In 1960, both pinks and sockeye as in past years, were almost exclusively used for canning purposes.

The pattern for chum marketing continued to reflect the small quantity available for canning with the result that only 86,818 cases were canned compared with 133,128 in 1959.

Coho (including blueback) landings were also down and the canned pack dropped from 213,105 cases in 1959 to 91,504 cases in 1960. However, more coho were utilized on the fresh and frozen market. Marketings of fresh coho increased from 1.33 million pounds worth \$523,500 in 1959 to 1.88 million valued at \$890,700 in 1960. Production of frozen dressed coho also increased and totalled 4.8 million pounds with a marketed value of \$2,590,000 compared to 2.67 million pounds worth \$1,261,000 the previous year.

With reduced landings, marketing of fresh springs declined in value from \$2,410,000 in 1959 to \$2,206,000 in 1960. Unit market prices for fresh and frozen spring salmon were up sharply in 1960. Mild-cured salmon produced declined from 691,700 in 1959 to 485,000 pounds in 1960. Smoked salmon showed little change in production.

The campned salmon pack in 1960 totalled 631,150 cases valued at \$22,768,000. This was the lowest pack reported since 1921 and was nearly \$12 million dollars less than in 1959.

#### HERRING

Landings of herring in 1960 totalled 93,838 tons and was the lowest yearly production reported in the past 10 years. As already mentioned, the herring operation was curtailed most of the year and full production did not get under way until November 20th. Catches between then and the end of the year were good but total production for the year was only 42% of the 222,000 tons reported in 1959.

Lower unit landed prices as well as declining prices for oil and meal resulted in the marketed value for herring products dropping from 8.8 million dollars in 1959 to \$3,450,000 in 1960.

#### HALIBUT

Halibut landings by Canadian fishermen at B. C. ports in 1960 totalled 27.2 million pounds, an increase of 3.4 million pounds over 1959. In addition, 6,706,000 pounds were landed at American ports by Canadian fishermen. Halibut landings by Canadians thus totalled 33.9 million pounds, the highest ever reported.

Average landed prices in B. C. were down 2.36¢ per pound to 16.12 cents per pound with the result that the landed value of Canadian landed halibut totalled \$4,379,000, down slightly from 1959. Marketed prices dropped by 2.14 cents per pound with the marketed total value increasing from \$6,236,000 in 1959 to \$6,534,000 in 1960.

#### SOLES

In 1960, total landings of sole jumped sharply and totalled 7,637,000 pounds valued at \$407,000, compared with 4,977,000 pounds in 1959. Marketed value showed a corresponding increase and totalled \$795,000 as compared to \$552,000 in 1959.

#### CRAB & SHRIMP

Shrimp production increased after the low year of 1959 from 1,043,000 pounds worth \$172,000 to 1,678,000 pounds valued at \$299,000 in 1960. Most of this production was sold as fresh or frozen meat and the marketed value increased from \$291,000 in the previous year to \$529,000 in 1960.

Crab production increased to record levels and totalled 5,068,000 pounds with a landed value of \$515,000. The marketed value also increased and totalled \$1,200,000 as compared to \$1,085,000 in 1959.

VESSELS & BOATS (Tables 5 and 6)

The 1960 inventory of boats operating in the B. C. Fishing industry showed 145 more boats than were reported in 1959. This includes 33 boats in the over-10-ton class; 103 in the less-than-10-ton class but longer than 20 feet, and an additional 9 in the 20-foot-or-less class.

As a result of this increase in numbers, coupled with higher unit values for boats due to improvements and added electrical equipment, the value of vessels at the end of 1960 totalled \$49,601,000, compared with \$46,853,000 in 1959.

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The 1,048 vessels in the 10-ton-and-over class were valued at \$27,935,000, while the 7,575 vessels in the under-10-ton group were appraised at \$21,666,000, compared with \$19,600,000 in 1959.

In the under-10-ton class, trollers showed the most significant increase and at the end of 1960, a total of 1,598 trollers under 10 tons but over 20 feet, were reported as compared to 1,420 in 1959.

#### GEAR & EQUIPMENT (Table 7)

The year-end inventory of boats and gear used in the primary fishery showed a sharp increase from \$7,701,000 reported in 1959 to \$8,545,000 in 1960. The increase was accounted for by an increase in salmon gillnets from 7,436 worth \$2,405,000 at the end of 1959 to 8,022 valued at \$2,692,000 in 1960.

Also of note was the increased value of salmon seines and a large number of crab traps.

It should be noted when examining this table that gear used during the year and worn out is regarded as a recurring expense and does not appear in the table since its value at year end is nil.

### NUMBER OF FISHERMEN LICENSED IN B. C. (Table 8)

The number of fishermen licensed in B. C. decreased from 14,463 in 1959 to 14,191 in 1960.
