SUMMARY OF FISHERIES STATISTICS OF BRITISH COLUMBIA - 1964

Total Value of Fish Products

For 1964, the market value of fish, whale, hair seal, and liver products amounted to 92.1 million dollars, compared with 76.0 million dollars in 1963.

The wholesale market value of salmon products amounted to 63 million dollars, other species including whales nearly 29 million dollars, and vitamin products \$55,000.

These values do not include:

- the value of halibut landed by B.C. fishermen at United States ports in Washington and Alaska, which in 1964 amounted to 8,168,000 pounds.
- the processed value of tuna imported and processed in B.C.

These two items amounted to \$5,820,000.

Noteworthy among the factors influencing production and the market year were:

- (1) A canned pack of 1,255,308 cases, higher than 1963 but below the 1954-1963 ten-year average of 1.37 million cases.
- (2) Herring production at 252,643 tons was second only to the record year of 1964 and the product value of \$11,561,000 was only 1.2% below that reported a year ago.
- (3) The average unit wholesale price of halibut increased by 2.9¢ per pound, and the increase in unit wholesale price resulted in a slightly higher marketed value at 8.0 million dollars in 1964 despite a lower volume of marketing.

SALMON

The wholesale value of all salmon products increased to 63.0 million dollars in 1964, compared with 49.0 million dollars in 1963. The canned pack of 1,255,308 cases was valued at 43.7 million dollars.

The sockeye pack of 343,358 cases was valued at 18.1 million dollars, and made up 41.4% of the value of the total canned pack. The wholesale value of coho totalled 16.4 million dollars.

The total value of "ALL SALMON" includes such products as offal, oil, meal, caviar, etc. which could (1) <u>NOTE:</u> The Jesignated to particular species. Also included are the values of some items when less than 3 companies reported.

The wholesale value of sockeye production in 1964 increased to 18.1 million dollars, compared with 8.5 million dollars in 1963. Most of this was represented by the value of canned sockeye salmon.

The value of coho marketing reached record proportions and totalled 16.4 million dollars or 4.2 million dollars higher than 1963. The value of the canned product represented 50% of this total.

Pink salmon marketings at the wholesale level dropped from 18.5 million dollars in 1963 to 12.5 million dollars in 1964.

The chum pack at 232,722 cases was nearly double that reported in 1963.

The total canned pack of 1,255,308 cases was slightly above the 1963 total of 1,203,271 cases. The wholesale value of the canned pack amounted to 43.7 million dollars or 9.2 million dollars higher than 1963.

HERRING

The herring fishery showed a decline from the record tonnage of 1963 and totalled 252,643 tons. Production of herring oil and meal were also down about 10%, but because of higher market prices the wholesale value of herring products totalled \$11,561,000, or only slightly less than the 1963 record.

Oil and meal production continue to dominate the marketing as other product forms remain relatively insignificant.

HALIBUT

British Columbia fishermen landed 25.1 million pounds in B.C. ports compared with 25.9 million pounds in 1963. Landings by Canadian fishermen to U.S. ports also declined and totalled 8.0 million pounds compared with 11.3 million pounds in 1963 and 10.0 million pounds in 1962.

However, unit prices to fishermen increased to 24.95¢ per pound compared with 22.06¢ in 1963 and 31.69¢ in 1962. The market value of halibut products reflected the increase in price as indicated by a total value of \$8,056,000 compared with \$7,993,000 in 1963.

GREY COD

Landings of grey cod reached record proportions and more than 12 million pounds were reported with a value to fishermen of \$722,000. Most of this was marketed as fresh or frozen fillets. The wholesale value of grey cod totalled \$1,160,000 compared with \$705,000 in 1963.

CRABS AND SHRIMP

Shrimp landings dropped sharply in 1964 and totalled 1,052,000 pounds valued at \$161,000 compared with 1,788,000 pounds a year ago worth \$284,000. Wholesale values for shrimp, mainly fresh and frozen meat, showed a corresponding drop and totalled \$312,000 in 1964.

Crab production increased sharply and totalled 4,351,000 pounds valued at \$699,000. The wholesale value of crabs marketed jumped from \$1,000,000 in 1963 to \$1,439,000 in 1964. Of this total, canned crab amounted to 7,724 cases valued at \$502,000.

VESSELS & BOATS (Tables 5 and 6)

For 1964, 9,343 boats and vessels were reported in British Columbia fisheries. This includes 5 whaling vessels.

The inventory of boats "over 10 tons" numbered 1,516, valued at \$45,016,000 compared with an estimated 1,367 and \$39,010,000 in 1963.

In the category of "less than 10 tons", 7,827 boats were reported. Their total value amounted to \$31,595,000.

It should be noted that boat statistics are compiled from information provided at time of licencing.

GEAR AND EQUIPMENT (Table 7)

Valuation on the inventory of gear, taken at the year-end, amounted to \$10,711,000 compared with \$10,096,000 in 1963.

Increases in numbers and value were noted in salmon gillnets and salmon seines.

NUMBER OF FISHERMEN LICENCED IN B.C.

Studies conducted by the Department of Fisheries has shown that a large number of fishermen who take out commercial licences are not commercial fishermen. Therefore, the number of licences issued is not an indication of the number of fishermen and has been discontinued.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

The information on products and their market values is provided on annual production forms completed by all processors in British Columbia. Collection and tabulation is done by the Economics Branch of the Department of Fisheries under arrangement with the Dominion Bureau of Statistics in Ottawa.

These statistics are finalized by the Bureau and used in their publication entitled "Fisheries Statistics of Canada".

Prior to this year, boats have been generally classified according to fishing type, but with the increasing trend to multi-purpose boats the usefulness of this type of classification is subject to question.

Many of the boats in the under 20' class shown in the above table do not actually participate in commercial fishing even though the owners are licenced as commercial fishermen.

Packers and collectors are included in the table, as well as five whales -- two of which are steam operated.

Tonnages shown represent registered net tonnages and the shipping registry has been used as a check wherever possible.
